



Get extra \$ OR pay less tax with the 2018 Child Tax Credit!

What Is The Child Tax Credit?

The Child Tax Credit is for people with 1 or more children. It is for people with low or medium incomes. When you file a tax return, the Child Tax Credit could lower your tax. You might also get a cash refund!



Who can get the Child Tax Credit?

To get the Child Tax Credit:


1. You must have a child. A child can be your son, daughter, stepson, stepdaughter, or adopted child. It can also be your brother, sister, niece, nephew, grandchild or **eligible foster** child.
 - Who is an eligible foster child? A child placed with you by a court or authorized placement agency. An example of a placement agency is the Department of Children's Services (DCS).
2. The child must live with you for more than half the year. **OR** you must have a signed divorce order or IRS Form 8332. The papers must say you can count the child as a dependent on your tax return. The rules are different for some kidnapped children.
3. The child must be 16 years old or younger on December 31, 2018.
4. The child must not provide more than half of their own support.

5. You must be able to get a dependent exemption on your tax return. See IRS Form 8901 for exceptions to this rule.
6. The child must be a citizen or United States (U.S.) resident or a certain type of U. S. National. The child must have a Social Security Number.

Important! When is your tax return due date or extended filing date? Did you or your child have a Social Security Number **before** that date? If not, you could **lose** your right to claim the Child Tax Credit or ACTC (Additional Child Tax Credit).

AND

7. Your income must be below a certain amount. How much you can make depends on how you file your taxes.
 - Are you **married and filing taxes jointly?** Then your income must be less than \$400,000.
 - Are you **married but filing your taxes separately?** Then your income must be less than \$200,000.
 - Are you the **head of household and a qualifying widow?** Then your income must be less than \$200,000.
 - Are you **single?** Then your income must be less than \$200,000.



What if your income is larger than these amounts? You may get some Child Tax Credit but it will be less.

How Much Child Tax Credit Can I Get?

It depends on how many children you have. The most you can get is:

- \$2,000 for 1 child
- \$4,000 for 2 children
- \$6,000 for 3 children
- \$8,000 for 4 children



This is the **most** you can get. You might get less.

To find out how much Child Tax Credit you can get, you should:

1. Call Tennessee Taxpayer Project at **1-866-481-3669**.



OR

2. Make a free call to Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Volunteer at **1-800-906-9887** It's a free call. Ask for the VITA near you. **OR** find a VITA site by going to **www.irs.gov** on the internet. Type VITA in the search box. Click the "find location" link.



OR

3. Talk to an AARP volunteer or Tax Counselor for the Elderly (TCE). Call **1-888-227-7669** for free to find the Tax Counselor near you

OR

4. Talk to a tax professional.

Will I Get a Cash Refund?

The cash refund is called an Additional Child Tax Credit or ACTC. **Important!** Are you getting a Child Tax Credit Refund or ACTC for 2016? Your refund will come **AFTER** February 15, 2017. The IRS will hold **all** of your tax refund until then, not just the ACTC part.

There are 2 ways you might get a Child Tax Credit cash refund or ACTC. **Important!** Are you

getting a Child Tax Credit Refund or ACTC for 2018? Your refund will come **AFTER** February 15, 2019. The IRS will hold **all** of your tax refund until then, not just the ACTC part.

1. You didn't use all the Child Tax Credit listed on your tax return.



AND

Your earned income is more than \$2,500. Earned income is money from wages, tips and self-employment.

How can you tell? Look at your income tax return. On Form 1040, look at line 11. Is it **less than**:

- \$2,000 for 1 child?
- \$4,000 for 2 children?
- \$6,000 for 3 children?
- \$8,000 for 4 children?

Then you may be able to get a cash refund. The most you can get is 15% of what you earned. You can't count the first \$2,500 you earned. The most you can get is \$1,400 per child.

OR

2. You did not use all of your allowed Child Tax Credit. **AND** you have 3 or more children.

You may be able to get a cash refund. How much will it be? Add up how much Social Security and Medicare taxes you paid. Then subtract any EITC (Earned Income Tax Credit) you got. How much is left? That is how much of a cash refund you may get. There may be other limits on your cash refund of child credit.

How do you get the cash refund?

You must file Form 8812 with the IRS. For more information, see IRS Publications 17 and 972.



Will the Child Tax Credit keep me from getting other help?

No. Do you meet the rules to get SNAP Food Stamps, public housing, welfare, SSI or TennCare? Getting the Child Tax Credit won't keep you from getting them.

Do you already get SNAP Food Stamps, public housing, Families First, SSI or TennCare? The Child Tax Credit should not change how much you get. This is true even if you get a cash refund.



The Child Tax Credit will not keep you from getting other help. It will not change how much help you get. **BUT** you must spend the Child Tax Credit refund in a certain period of time.

What if you are turned down for SNAP Food Stamps, public housing, welfare, SSI or TennCare? What if how much you are getting goes down? If it is because of the Child Tax Credit, call:

Is the Child Tax Credit like the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC)?

No. They have different rules.

Do you make too much to get EITC? You can make more and still get the Child Tax Credit. Some people can get **both**.

With the Child Tax Credit, you can:

1. Get more Child Tax Credit if you have more than 3 children **AND**
2. File a separate return.



Can I get both the Child Tax Credit and Earned Income Credit?

Yes, if you meet the rules for both.
